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Project summary

The first large-scale participatory study across the UK and Ireland to explore lived experience-led criminal justice, focussing on:

- **The past:** historical and archival research
- The present: Innovative, arts-based participatory methods
- **The future:** future focused design methods and lived experience voices Our goal? Ethical and imaginative praxis that could transform criminal justice.

- Kicked off with a 2-day team retreat at Gladstone's Library (Flintshire)
- Trauma-Informed Research training completed
- Design based pilot and design sprint manifesto completed
- Published Generative Justice chapter and submitted history-based article
